Outline

The aim of this course is to introduce essential multi-dimensional aspects of Contemporary Japanese Politics, including politics, economics, society, foreign policy and international relations. At the end of the course, students will have strong knowledge and a good understanding of basic characteristics of contemporary Japan, and will be able to identify and be familiar with problems and challenges Japan has faced. Students are **expected to read in advance:** Ian Neary, *The State and Politics in Japan*, Cambridge: Polity, 2002, which is also used as the main text of the class.

Course Structure

The course consists of a series of discussion classes. In each class, a student or students will be allocated a chapter and will be required to present a summary (with comments) for each chapter.

- 8. Bureaucratic Structure and their Reform
- 9. Parliament
- 10. Local Government

Day 3 (29 January 2009)

- 11. Foreign and Defense Policy
- 12. Industrial Policy
- 13. Social Welfare Policies
- 14. Human Rights in Japan
- 15. Preparation for Assignment

Assessment

The course offers two sorts of assignments. One is, as mentioned above, that students are required to present a summary of particular chapter(s) that have been allocated. The other is that students are required to submit a 5,000 word essay at the end of the course. The details will be presented in the first class. Presentation(s) and the essay are of equal weight for course marks.
